FIRST FAMILIES OF IONIA COUNTY WELCOME 24 NEW MEMBERS.

The Ionia County **Genealogical Society held** its 2nd annual awards banquet on Saturday. October 17th at the St **Johns Episcopal Church** Parish House in Ionia. Michigan. HELPFUL HINTS FOR GETTING ORGANIZED.

In order to be successful at anything you have to be organized. Here are some weekly steps you can take to get a good start on organizing your genealogical data. This is mainly for folks who have computers, but use the same advice for non-computer users.

- 1. Clear your desk and make four piles.
- a. To be filed
- b. Correspondence to write
- c. Research to Do
- d. Photos put them all in a box and we will sort them later.
- 2. Check your supplies. Make sure you have all the necessary tools needed. For example: pencils, pens, formatted disks, page protectors, 3 ring binders, printer ribbons or ink cartridges, paper for printer, paper for note taking, envelopes for mailing, disk mailers, acid free boxes & paper, postage stamps.
- 3. Set up your computer desk so that you are comfortable. Buy the necessary equipment to accomplish that goal. Have a clipboard nearby to scribble questions on when you are having computer problems.
- 4. If you have not developed a filing system, you may choose one of these. Create a surname notebook for every surname you are researching. Alphabetize by first name in each surname book with a four-generation chart for each person. Make a list of direct family lines in chronological order.

The other way is to put all direct family groups sheets in chronological order, youngest to oldest, in each notebook with a label saying DIRECT LINE. Then put all the collateral lines in the same order marked COLLATERAL LINE. The rest of the miscellaneous papers to in a catagory marked UNKNOWN RELATIONS.

- 5. Put all important documents from your TO BE FILED PILE in page protectors and file in the notebooks, making copies if they are needed in more than one file.
- 6. Write the letters that you have been putting off.
- 7. Put all the information that is in the notebooks into your computer. Be sure to document sources! We cannot stress how important systematic and thorough documentation is. It separates facts from old family stories.
- 8. Sort your photos into generations and put them into manila envelopes and mark them.
- 9. Get involved in your local genealogical society. Learn from each other.
- 10. Write an article for your genealogical society about your family history or another point of interest. The editor welcomes all entries.
- II. When traveling on vacations, check out the towns where your ancestors have been. Learn about the history of those towns. You may find they are very similar to the countries where they came from. Take lots of photos and document what the photo is on a

notebook as you take it so when you develop the film you will remember what is what.

THE GENEALOGICAL DEATH INDEXING SYSTEM UPDATE

- Michigan Department of
 Community Health Director James K.
 Haveman, Jr. announced that
 additional years of information have
 been added to the Genealogical Death
 Indexing System (GENDIS), an
 internet system of Michigan Death
 records from before the turn of the
 century.
- GENDIS, which first appeared on the internet in April 1998, is a rich resource for historical death record information. This information includes the name of the decedent; the date, place, and cause of death; the decedent's occupation; parents' names and residence, and the decedents's place of birth. This indexing system, which is being maintained by the Division of Vital Records and Health Statictics, allows genealogists and others to use key facts, such as the decedents name of year of death, to locate and view records of interest.
- "I'm so pleased that this automated indexing system on the internet is receiving such positive response from our customers," said

Haveman. "This is a finedemonstration of how the state can use modern technology to improve service."

- This service is possible thanks to the efforts of volunteer genealogists from all across the state and with the support of the Michigan Genealogical Council and the Abrams Foundation. This project, which began in 1987. has been conducted under the careful coordingation of Margaret Tager Walker, a genealogist and coordinator of the project for the Michigan Genealogical Council. Copies of these early death records are prepared and distributed to volunteer genealogists across the state to be carefully deciphered and transcribed. These transcriptions are then captured electroncially and inserted into the data file used by GENDIS.
- The latest update provides information on an additional 63,500 death records to GENDIS data file, which now spans 1867-1882 for a total of 148,000 records. When completed, the database will contain approximately 481,000 death records for the years 1867 through 1897.
- Since April 1998, over 40,000 genealogists and others interested in locating death information have visited the GENDIS Web site.

DAVE JOHNSON OF STATE ARCHIVES OF MICHIGAN SPEAKS TO ICGS

Dave Johnson, from the State
Archives of Michigan was the guest
speaker at a recent meeting of the
Ionia County Genealogical Society.
Dave is an archivist for the historical
center and shared his expertise with a
group of about 20 members.

The program began with a slide presentation displaying the history of the State Archives and what types of items are stored there. Established in

- 1913, the State of Michigan Archives is the official depository of the state's records. Unique materials dating from the pre-statehood territorial era to the present-day are maintained and preserved in the archives. There are over 80 million items housed at the Archives and they fall into 5 basic categories: state government records, local government records, maps, photographs and private manuscripts. Items of particular interest to genealogists include maps, immigration and naturalization records, Civil War records, state census records, land records, military records and vital records.
- Department of State supporters of the Archives really became active, but it was in 1957 that marked a turning point in the State Archives of Michigan. A fire broke out and hundreds of valuable documents were destroyed. The result of this event was the development of the records management program they have today whereby all the records are stored in archival safe and fire safe areas. Hence came the Michigan Historical Center as we know it today.
- Unlike libraries, items in the Archives are one of a kind items that cannot be replaced and therefore security measures taken are necessary to ensure their safekeeping. The staff in the Archives assist each person with what they need and one may be asked to sit at a specific table, put on a pair of white linen gloves, or just look, not touch a particular item, depending on how fragile it is. Failure to follow procedure will result in being asked to leave the premises.
- According to Johnson, only 5% of what is owned by businesses or personal homes are considered to have permanent archival value. Johnson explained the differences between museums, libraries and archives. Museums collect objects of historical value, while the Archives is a collection of one of a kind items which are evidentially significant (i.e. legal documents) or informational

(person, places, events). Library items are purchased and can be replaced and are governed by the interest of the people. Archival items are donated by businesses, government agencies and private citizens. "Archives are records, but not all records are archives," explains Johnson. Strict guidelines are established and adhered to by the Archives.

The hours of the State of Michigan Archives are Monday through Friday 10:00 to 4:00 p.m. except state holidays. The address is 717 West Allegan, Lansing, MI 48918-1837 Advance appointments are not necessary, but they may make the visit more worthwhile. Visit the web site at

DID YOUR ANCESTOR HELP SAVE THE FLAG? In the Civil War of 1861-1865

- Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865 encourage you to join in the effort to save our proud heritage.
- LIGIBILITY is open to all daughters (grand-daughters, etc., direct descendants) of honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, and marines who served in the Union Army or Navy during the Rebellion of 1861-1865, including those who died or were killed during their term of service, whether members of the Grand Army of the Republic or not, who have attained the age of eight years, are eligible for membership.
- Eligibility is through lineal descent only and not through adoption. The eligibility can never be changed. You must furnish a complete war record of your ancestor.
- The organization pursues genealogical projects which include recording Civil War discharge papers, recording ancestors' war and personal

records, recording history of members known descendants, locating Civil War burial records of various counties and towns. Patrotic projects include flag presentations. Educationally maintain scholarship programs, and historically maintaining and collecting Civil War artifacts and mementos; putting monuments and markers at appropriate universities, public buildings, parks and battlefields; recording and preserving Union Civil War monuments throughout the country. OLD HISTORY OF TOWNSHIPS IS INTERESTING

Taken from an old history of Ionia county, Michigan, published by J. D. Dillenbeck, of Grand Rapids, and printed at Lansing in 1872.

KEENE TOWNSHIP

Is one of the western tier of townships in the county; is bounded on the north by Otisco, on the east of Easton, on the south by Boston, and on the west by Vergennes, in Kent County.

The soil and timber of the township are somewhat diversified. The eastern part is timbered with beech, maple, etc., and a soil, generally of clay or loam, somewhat rolling in the southern portion, but generally _mite level, and in the northeastern part of the town somewhat marshy. The soil in the western part of the township is lighter, especially in the vicinity of Flat river, is timbered largely with oak; and in great part consisted of what is known as oak-openings. Flat river, the only important stream in the township, enters Keene from Otisco, at the western part of section five, leaves it again at the north of section seven, after a short curve in the

adjoining township of Vergennes, re-enters Keene, and making short circuit, finally leaves it at the southern part of section eighteen. Near the line between sections six and seven it is spanned by a fine covered bridge built in 1869 at a cost of \$2000. There are two small lakes in the township, each of a few acres in extent, which are situated, respectively on sections ten and twenty-two.

This township was an unbroken wilderness until late in the fall of 1837, when two young men. names Orran Owen and Charles Hickox came from Monroe county, New York, built a shanty on section 25, and commenced chopping. Edward **Butterfield from Oakland** county and Cyrus Rose from Easton, commenced work about the same time, and on February 2nd, 1838, Mr. **Butterfield brought his** family into the township and settled on section 25. and was therefore the first settler. Mr. Rose settled on section 36 in December following.

Among the settlers of 1838 are James Monk, who came from Canada and settled on section 26, in March of that year; Morton Reynolds, also from Canada, who settled on section 27 in April; John Foliett also from Canada, who settled on section 35;
John Connor, from Oakland
county, who also settled on
section 35; James Chrysler,
from Canada, who settled
on section 26; Samuel Wells
from St. Lawrence county,
New York, who settled on
section 23 in May, and
Dexter Cutler, who in June
settled near the bank of
Flat River.

Of this number Messrs. Owen, Rose, Follett and Cutier now reside in the township. Messrs. Monk, Chrysler and Wells, in adjoining township of Boston. Mr. Butterfield died March 29th, 1846; Mr. Hickox in 1870 and Mr. Connor was killed by a falling tree in September 1851. William Lott, now of Bowne, Kent county, settled in Keene in 1838 or 1839, and for some time kept a public house.

The first birth in the township was that of Berilla, daughter of Morton and Alvira Reynolds, on May 17th, 1838. The settlers of 1839 were Philip Monk, James Baird and Elisha Sprague, all from Canada, and who came previous to August 5th, the time of what is known as the "land sale." Prior to this time the settlers had squatted on the lands which they wished to purchase but could not, for the reason that they had some time before been withdrawn from market. The settlers of

Keene organized themselves into a club to prevent their lands being taken by speculators, and chose Asa L. Spencer, of Otisco, as their agent. The remaining settlers of the year 1839 were David and Stephen Shaul, from Herkimer county, and John L. Covert, Jenison Henry and Simon Heath from Orleans county, New York. Mr. Covert now resides in Vergennes, Kent county. The Messrs. Shaul soon removed to Canada. Mr. Monk died in 1863, Mr. Baird in 1864, Mr. Sprague in 1869. Mr. Henry was killed by the fall of a tree, March 18th, 1851. The first death in the township was that of Mary, wife of Robert Rose. A daughter died soon after and Mr. Rose returned to Canada without locating in the township.

The settlers of 1840 were Thomas Beattle, his son Nathaniel, Joseph Brown, Zelotero B. Frost, Ephriam Abbott, Stephen Sparks, Henry V. N. Covert, **Nathaniel Davenport**, **Prindle Hubbell and Delos** Gibson, Of this number, Messrs. Frost, Covert, Gibson and Davenport now reside in the township, and Nathaniel Beattie is a resident of Ionia. Prindle Hubbell died in 1855. Thomas Beattie in 1856, Joseph Brown in 1857, and **Ephriam Abbott a few years** since. In January of 1840

occurred the first wedding in Keene. Alvin Butterfield was married to Miss Ilena Phipps, by George Dexter, Esq., of Easton.

The territory embraced within the present township of Keene formed a part of Otisco, for political purposes until the spring of 1842. The first measures to secure an independent organization were taken at the general election in 1841, when a petition was circulated, praying the Legislature to organize the township of Keene, which was done at the following session of the Legislature. The name of the new township was proposed by E. Butterfield, Esq., Keene being the name of his native township in New Hampshire. After the organization of the township was effected, that portion of its territory lying northwest of Flat river remained attached to Otisco until the year 1869, when it was united to the remainder of the township of Keene. That part of Boston which lies north of Grand river, was for several vears attached to Keene.

The first annual meeting in the township was held at the house of Nathaniel Beattie, on Monday, April 4th, 1842. John L. Covert acted as moderator; Edward Butterfield, Aaron Hardenbough, Nathaniel Beattie and Ephriam Abbott

as inspectors, and Simon Heath as cierk. There were 39 votes cast at the election, and the following board of officers elected: Supervisor, Asaph C. Smith; township clerk, Cyrenus Day; township treasurer, Samuel Wells; justices of the peace, John L. Covert, Joseph W. Sprague, Aaron Hardenbough, Zaccheus H. Brower; commissioners of highway, Henry V.N. Covert, Asa R. Phipps, George W. White: associate assessors, John C. Court, Elisha Sprague; school inspectors, Simon Heath, James Chrysler, Asaph C. Smith; overseers of the poor, James Baird, Granson L. Hall; constables, John N. Butterfield, Prindle Hubbell, George W. White, Sprague. Among the others not yet mentioned, who have acted an important part in transforming this part of the great wilderness into one of the finest agricultural townships of Grand River valley, may be named Ida Pinkney, Philip D. Marble, Francis Potter and many others who were pioneers in various parts of the township, and many of whom still remain to enjoy the fruits of their former energy and perseverance in midst of privation.

Keene is peculiarly an agricultural township, having no railroad, mill, hotel or church within its

limits. Ephriam Abbott & Co., have a fine establishment for the manufacture of chairs, rakes, etc., built in 1869 and situated in the western part of section 22. This, and the blacksmith shop of George H. Hart, on the south line of section 9, are the only manufactories in the township.

The first post office was established about 1845; it was named Avon, and the postmaster was Asaph C. Smith. This office was afterward removed to Easton. Another post office called Rix, was maintained for several years near the center of the town, but was finally discontinued and the present post office of Keene established, on the eastern part of section 21.

Keene has two
cemeteries, one on second
17 and the other on section
28.

The first school-house was built in 1842, where the Potter schoolhouse now stands, in district No. 1. Miss Ruth Hunt of Lyons, was the first teacher. The present house was built some years later.

The Sayles schoolhouse in district No. 2 is a fine brick building, erected in 1870 on the western part of section 30.

The Day schoolhouse, in district No. 3, is a brick building of fair size situated

on the west line of section 27 and was built in 1869.

The White schoolhouse, in district No. 4, is a medium-sized frame building, built some 14 years since, and situated on the south line of section 34.

The Marble schoolhouse in district No. 5 is a small frame building, standing on the northeast corner of section 17, and was erected in 1848.

The Tasker schoolhouse in district No. 6, is a small frame building, located near the center of section 11.

The Stevens schoolhouse, in district No. 7, is a small frame building, situated on the southeast corner of section 26 and was built in 1870.

The Bowen schoolhouse, in district No. 8, stands on the west line of section 21. It is a small frame building, erected in 1855.

The Striped schoolhouse, in district No. 9, is a fair sized frame building, on the northern part of section 15, and was built in 1864.
