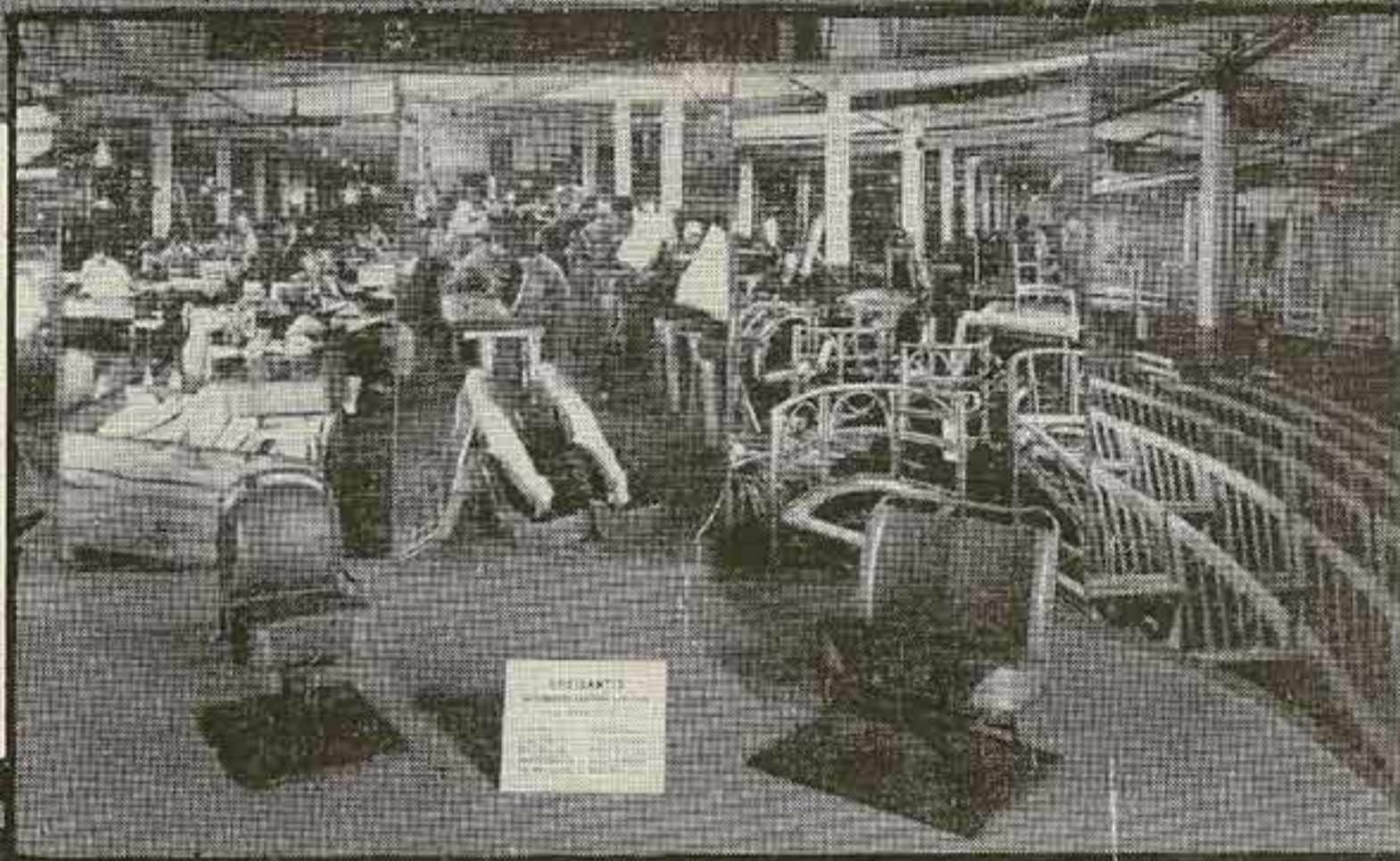

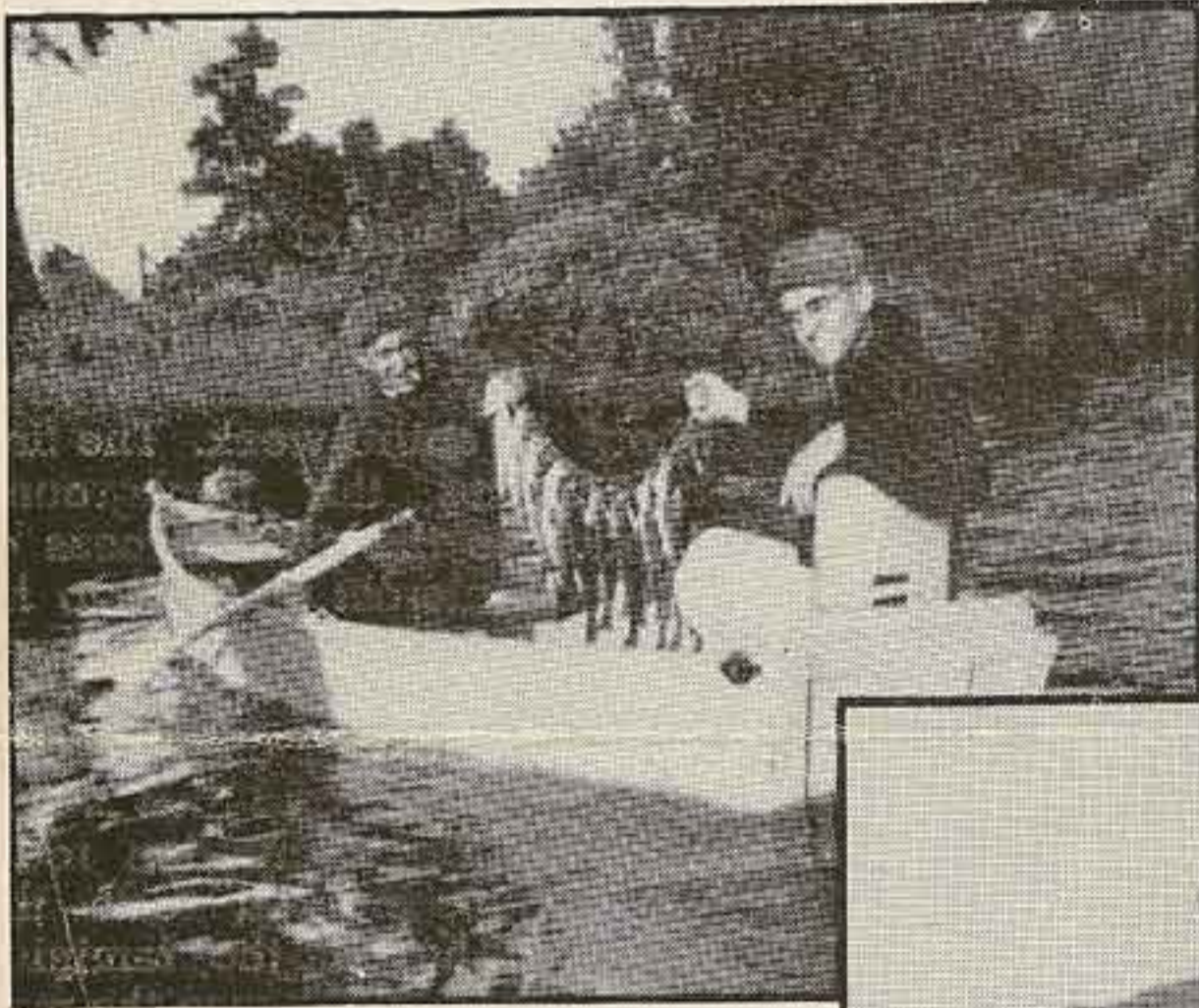

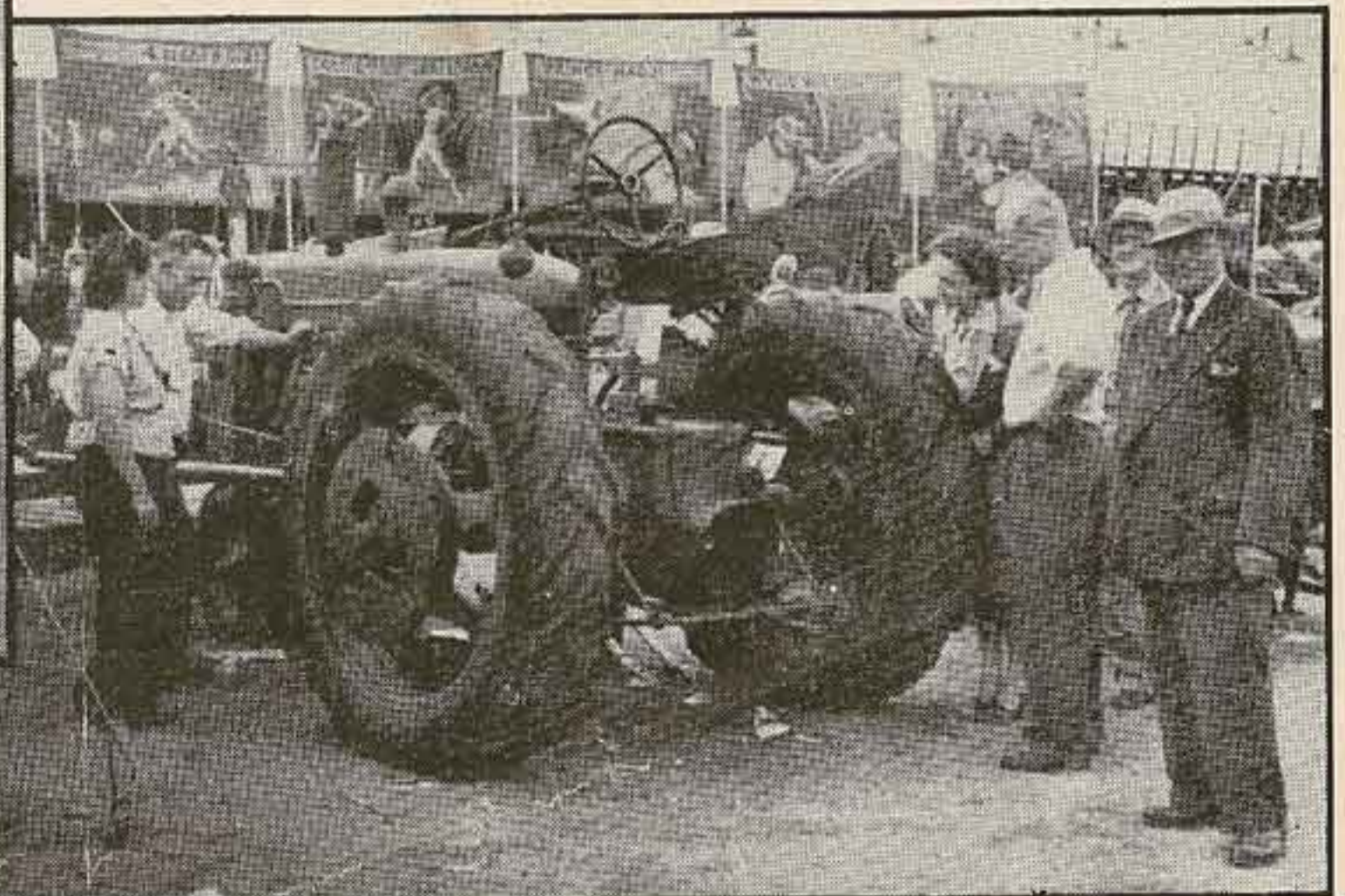

The game with Portland which was played at the County Park turned out better, with Ypsi defeating them, 10-5. Ypsi collected 15 hits off Portland pitchers.

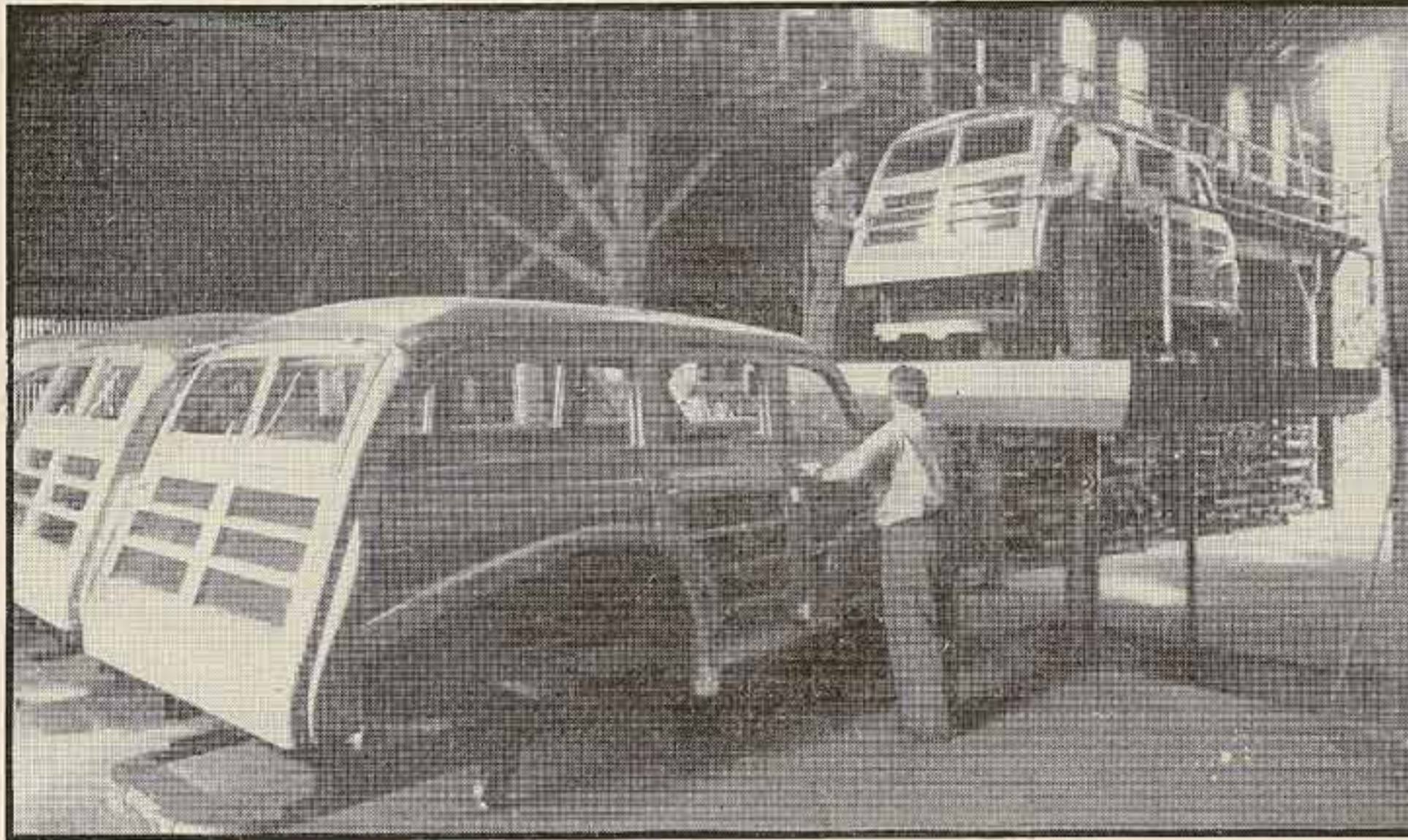

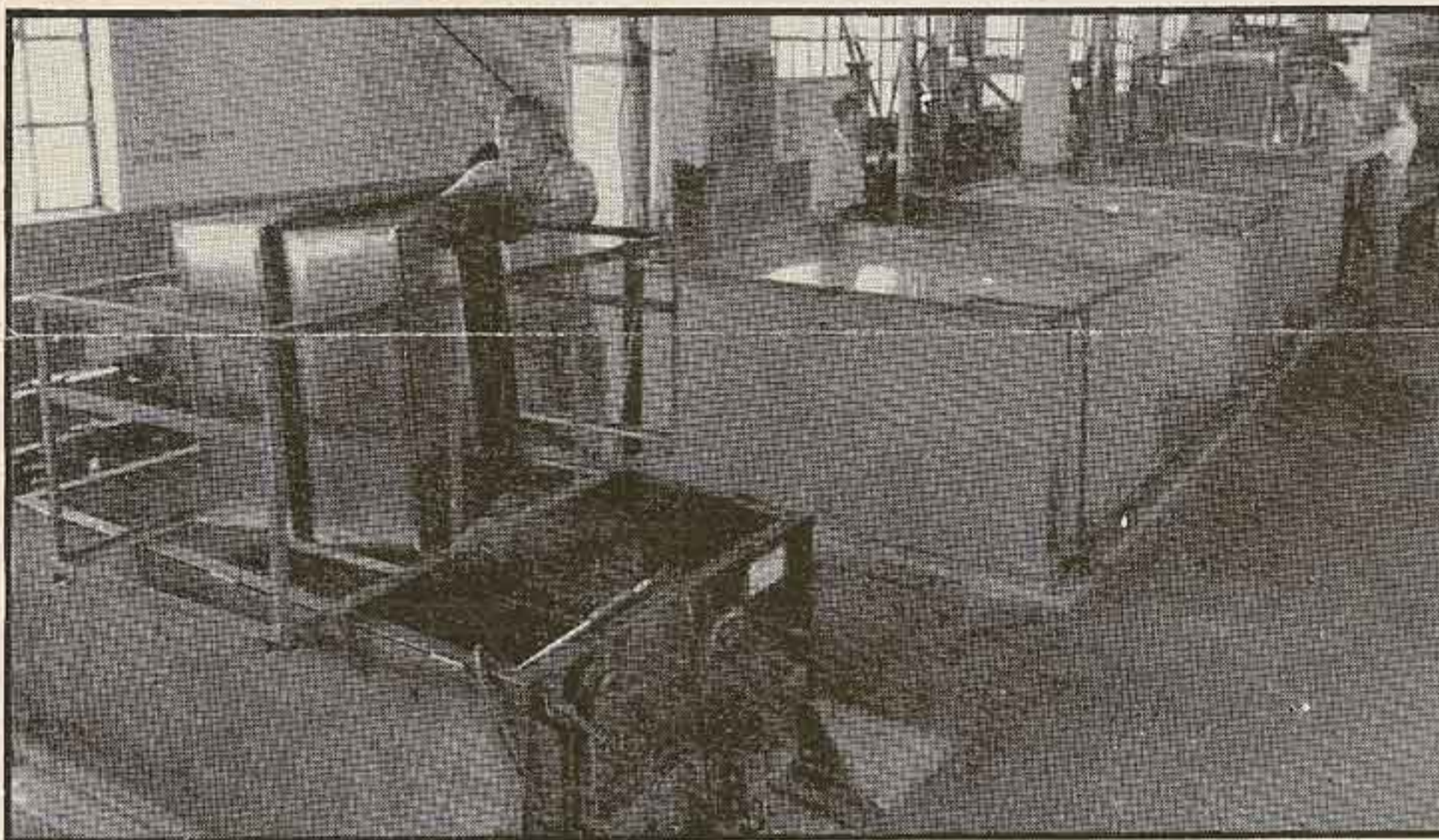

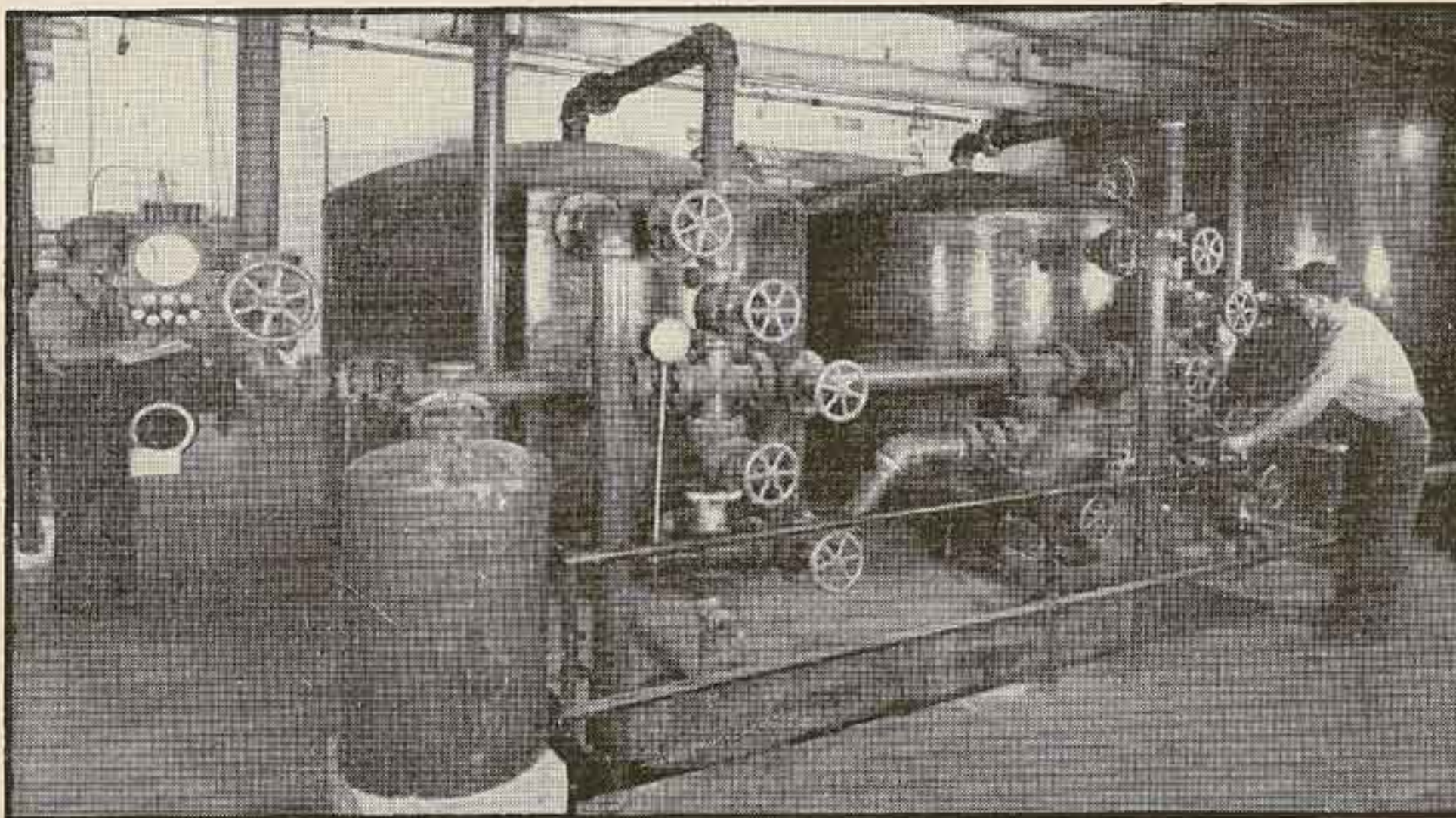
## ★ NEW BODY LIFT

The loading lift is used for loading Pontiac station wagon bodies into the haulaway trucks. It is capable of loading four bodies in approximately 30 minutes. It raises from floor level to 15 feet and has a capacity of 2000 pounds. This replaces the old "block and tackle" method that had to be used while waiting for the new lift to arrive and be installed.



## ★ NEW BONDERIZING TANKS

The Bonderite treatment consists in immersing the properly cleaned articles in the hot bonderite solution (180-200°F) from 2-5 minutes. This process converts the metal surface to a uniform rust-proof protection and increases the adhesion of any paint finish applied thereon. ## ★ NEW WATER FILTERS

The new filters pictured at left were recently installed and are used to filter the water before it goes into the softening tank. They supply water for the boilers, turbines, air compressors and welding machines.
